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### editorial

Dear readers,

we think that the question „which media and e-skills are necessary for the children in their future work-life?“ is of importance for parents, teachers and educators. Although not all skills shall be measured according to economic standards and their „usefulness“ for the economy and the corporate world – still it is important to discuss which are the relevant skills which today's pupils are going to need in order to find their way in the working environment of the future.

The use, critical assessment and the ability to produce media in more and more contexts is without any doubt a highly relevant topic for **ecml**, the European Center for Media Literacy. But we are talking about different kinds of literacies which are necessary for living in the 21<sup>st</sup> century; there are civic literacy, scientific literacy, technological literacy, visual literacy, multicultural literacy, digital literacy and many more. Expanding the concept of literacy has indeed consequences for educators in the classroom and these shall be discussed in workshops organised in the **ecml** framework – you can read more about them in the „news“ section of this **emlr**.

Furthermore, we are currently reflecting on the necessity to provide local and national networking – the proud title „European Center for Media Literacy“ announces to work in the European context. Still, the contact to national stakeholders is the prerequisite to provide networking and discussion on a European level. For this purpose the localisation of contents was also aimed at. **Ecml** results are available in English, Spanish, French, German, Italian and Finnish for the dissemination activities in the wider European audience.

We are now starting an additional experiment – well, partly it is already ongoing: we dive into the possibilities of networking via an online community! We use the facilities of the European Schoolnet to provide a platform and give the opportunity to discuss in German, Italian and Finnish with project partners, and we wish to motivate everybody who is interested, to share his or her ideas also with international colleagues in an English forum. Just to illustrate what expects you there: we have opened discussion threads on the gender aspect and ask the question „Does media education come in pink and blue?“ - furthermore, we say „Go play games!“ and discuss the aspect of gaming, such as learning through games, being „game literate“

and the dangers and threats posed by excessive use of this medium, etc. You are welcome to open any thread that is of interest for you and our moderators will try to provide you with discussion inputs as far as possible!  
We are looking forward to experiencing this truly interactive channel.

### **Media education in Austria:** ready for the digital age?

Currently your **ecml** team is busy organising the national workshops. As you have already been informed in the last newsletters, the Austrian team as well as the Italian, hold their information days in October. First, the workshop **Fit für das digitale Zeitalter!** [which we could roughly translate with „Get ready to work in the digital age!“] is going to be held on October 21, 2005 in Vienna, Austria. For this event we have gained the support of the Austrian Ministry of Science and Education as host. We welcome international guests such as our partner Tapio Varis, who is professor for media education at the University of Tampere in Finland, UNESCO Chair for global e-learning and president of the „Global University System“ (GUS). Apart from being fluent in Finnish, English and Spanish, we have also been impressed by his German skills and so we are able to keep the workshop in the national language and nevertheless provide the truly international viewpoints on media literacy and e-skills topics. The second speaker comes from the international organisation CEDEFOP, Franz Gramlinger. The scientific manager of the Center for Social Innovation, Josef Hochgerner, will be moderating an expert panel including Peter A. Bruck ([www.medienprofessor.at](http://www.medienprofessor.at)), Brigitte Hipfl ([www.oefeb.at](http://www.oefeb.at)), Peter Littig ([www.dekra-akademie.de](http://www.dekra-akademie.de)), Friedrich Moshhammer ([www.ams.or.at](http://www.ams.or.at)) and Elke Reichel ([www.verdi.de](http://www.verdi.de)). ### **Media education in Italy:** thumbs up or down?

On 31st October 2005, at the Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore in Milan, a public of experts and common people will gather to discuss about the situation of media education in Italy. **Vivere, comprendere, insegnare i media: prospettive di educazione ai/con i media** - "Live, understand and teach the media: educational perspectives with and about media" will be the first national workshop organised by the **ecml** project in Italy, and it may shed a light on the recent discoveries in the ever-changing field of media.

Expectations are high, especially because well-known people in the field of media education will discuss their points of view at the conference. The keynote speakers are Prof. Roberto Giannatelli and Prof. Pier Cesare Rivoltella: the first, as director of MED Medmediaeducation, one of the most eminent institutions for media literacy in Italy, will describe his experience towards a better understanding of what this subject is all about, especially when it comes to consider it as part of school curriculum. MED not only carries out projects with such aims, but also coordinates a 'summer camp' where all those who wish to perfect their skills and broaden their knowledge in media are welcome. The second is the point of reference for the Italian academic world in the field of communication science, with a deep knowledge on how to improve media skills and teach the influence of such a powerful means of communication on society. Prof. Rivoltella contributed to the foundation of MED and spent considerable efforts into promoting its activity in Italy.

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During the various sessions, participants will deal with several aspects of media literacy: from the “Everyday media: influences, critical analyses and reactions” discussion on media and society, a down-to-earth exchange of ideas to help those who do not know much about the impact on media on public up to an approach from the point of view of experts in the session dedicated to the “Educational resources and projects in Italy”, where participants will define how this subject can be developed and improved at school.

Another fundamental aspect is the session focused on Italian and European projects on media education and the influence of media in general. To clearly understand what is needed to improve skills in a specific field, it is necessary to look up for examples, this is why projects are the ideal reference. For Italy only, MED association will present its “MENS” project aimed at introducing media literacy in primary school. On an international level, GlocalYouth project concentrates on the effects of media products on young people and their intercultural impact, as well as the benefits of media education, with a special attention on the world Northern and Southern regions. Ch.I.Ps project, which closes the session, delves into the resources needed to focus on media awareness by providing a catalogue of best practices for children, families and teachers.

A workshop is not worth its name without a session entirely focused on the various fields of media (TV, newspapers, adverts) and how to teach them. A three-hour session will involve all participants into a thorough analysis of such aspects, guided by experts from MED association.

### **Get ready to work in the digital age!**
